Rook News – Feature



Last week Mrs Willcox told us about her passion for Geography and why she felt studying this subject is so important. In this issue, we hear from our new teacher Mr Mills about his passion for sport and how he transitioned from a career as a professional footballer to become a teacher.

Can you tell us a bit about your career history?

My working career started at the age of 16 when I moved to London to begin an apprenticeship as a football player at Tottenham Hotspur Football Club. After turning professional I spent five years working in London and during this time I had the honour of representing England as a youth international from Under 16 to Under 19 as well as loan spells at both Brentford and Gillingham Football Clubs.

Why did you decide to become a teacher?

I have always loved sport and felt that this was an area of work I would be able to make a difference in. When I moved on from professional football and was deciding on a new career path I applied for a role assisting the PE department at The Wellington Academy. From there I was given more responsibility for clubs and then lessons. Before I knew it I was teaching a full timetable as an unqualified teacher. Having experienced teaching and seen the impact a teacher can have in a young person's life, I knew this was the career for me. It did mean enrolling on a five-year distance learning Bachelor of Science degree course and then a further two years of teacher training, but it was all worth it.

Why do you think PE is an essential part of the curriculum and why are you passionate about your subject area?

Having taught PE for seven years I have seen how crucial PE is to the curriculum. Not only does it have the obvious benefits for a young person's physical fitness and gives pupils the opportunity to participate in a range of sport, but it also has huge psychological benefits. Mental skills such as resilience, perseverance, coping with adversity, teamwork and leadership, to name a few, can all be developed and improved through the PE curriculum. The thing I am most passionate about in PE is being able to encourage students to attempt things even when they may not succeed. This is just as important for the ablest students as well as those who find sport challenging. Seeing students push themselves to improve without fear of failure is a huge success in my eyes.

What advice would you have for any young person that wishes to pursue a career as a professional sports person?

I have been asked many times in my teaching career what advice I would give to someone pursuing a career in professional sport and unfortunately my answer isn't what people are always looking for. Aside from the ability to play the sport to an elite level, it requires incredible dedication and a huge sacrifice of time, luck to avoid injury and then the psychological strength to succeed. It is a hugely rewarding career path but I believe anyone pursuing it should have other options if professional sport does not become a full-time career.

School News – Trips

On Friday 28 September Year 8 travelled to Durdle Door to study the coastal features and management along the South Coast Path.

The sun was shining and it was a perfect day to be on the beach. We first went to Durdle Door to look at how the Jurassic Coast has changed over the last few million years! We looked at the erosional processes that created the magnificent arch as well as the new features being created along the way. Our next stop took in Man-O-War bay. We climbed back up to the top of the cliffs and walked along to Stair Hole and Lulworth.

Pupils were looking out for coastal management strategies along the way and admiring the geological processes shaping the land. The pupils reviewed the processes of erosion and reminded themselves about differential erosion of differing rock types creating the magnificent features at Stair Hole and the spectacular Lulworth Cove.

A great day of reinforcing their classroom teaching by learning outside the classroom watching Geography in action!

On Friday 5 October, Year 9 went to the town of Cheddar to see to what extent tourism impacts on the area as part of their Geography topic. We started off by having a guided tour of the caves, seeing the replica skeleton of Cheddar Man, the oldest complete human skeleton, and of course all of the fabulous cave features including some pretty impressive stalactites and stalagmites.

The pupils all then ventured into Cheddar itself to complete various different types of field work including a land use survey, environmental survey, business questionnaires and tourist questionnaires amongst others. All of this work was then duly rewarded by an obligatory trip to possibly the best ice cream/sweet fudge shop ever before the long journey home!

School News – Trips



Tensions were running high on the 4 October, as the Year 10 and 11 GCSE Drama pupils set off to London to watch Stephen Mallatrat's spine-chilling theatre production of 'The Woman In Black'. Before they saw the award-winning play they attended a special workshop at the Fortune Theatre which is specifically tailored to the GCSE syllabus. The workshop was led by veteran actor Mike Southern who has performed in the West End for over 15 years.

The workshop examined the techniques and mechanics that make the play such an effective piece of theatre, showing our pupils how 'The Woman in Black' creates tension and engages the audience to make them feel unnerved. They got to take part in the ghostly tale themselves working with the text, the set and each other to tell a story. It was great to see the pupils really throw themselves into this experience and grow in confidence as they did.

Our Senior Drama Prefect Polly said "To have the opportunity to perform on the same stage as the actors of 'The Woman In Black' was a real treat. We learnt how to build dramatic tension on the stage and read some parts of the script and even got to use some of the actual props."

'The Woman In Black' has been running for 27 years and it is clear that the success of this production is down to the two main (and only) actors whose superb multi-role narration truly captures the imagination of the audience. In summary, the play is about a lawyer, Arthur Kipps who employs an actor to tell his disturbing ghostly tale in the hope that by doing so the spirit of the woman in black who terrorises him will be exorcised once and for all. Does it work? Well, you will have to pay a visit to the Fortune Theatre to find out.

Commenting on the production Year 11 pupil Kristina said; "The show was brilliant and we were all on the edge of our seats the whole time as it was very intense – I definitely want to see it again."

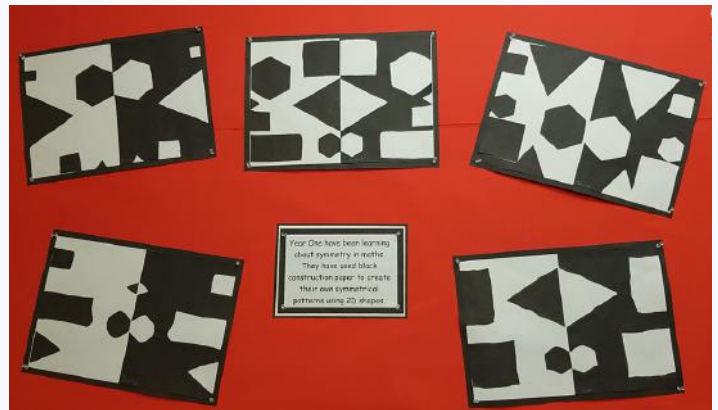
Nursery, Reception and Year 1

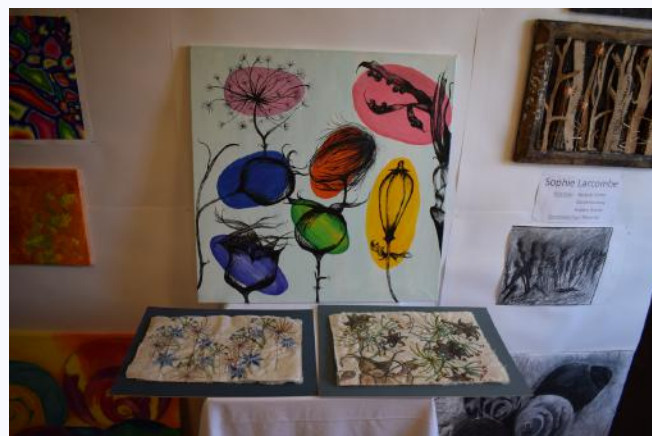
Artistic success
