# School News - National Champions

On Saturday 1 December, Xen, Amelie and I took part in the ISA National Swimming Championships at the London Olympic Pool. We had qualified to represent London West at the event, and there were seven regions competing from across the whole of England.

Amelie (Y4) was the first to swim in the 50m backstroke – given it was one of her first times competing in a 50m pool, she swam brilliantly coming away with a silver medal and took four seconds off her personal best. I was up next in the 100m backstroke. I have swum at this pool before and really enjoyed it but even still, I was nervous. I swam a strong race and was really pleased to win silver. My next race was the 4x50m medley relay and our team swam exceptionally well to win gold by several seconds. Both Amelie and I were honoured to have our medals presented to us by double Olympian, Chris Walker-Hebborn.


The afternoon session began with my 100m freestyle – it was a great race and I was really pleased to win a second silver medal and get a very good personal best time. There were over 80 races in the event so it was a long day but the racing was exciting and London West were performing really well.

The final races were the 4x50m freestyle relays in which all three of us took part. The teams are made up of the four fastest swimmers in the region and you don't actually get any time to practice changeovers as a team, so the relays can be a bit chaotic. However, London West teams were all strong. Amelie's relay team were up first and she stormed the first leg to give her team a huge lead, which they hung on to to win gold. Next up was Xen's relay team – he swam 3rd leg and again, put in a fantastic swim to bring his team into medal contention. They came away with a well-earned silver medal. Finally, my really team was up. After two legs we were in 3rd, on the 3rd leg our swimmer brought us into a close 2nd position to East Anglia – and I was on the blocks knowing we had a chance. We both took off the blocks neck and neck and were next to each other in the lanes so I knew where the swimmer was. I felt I swam strongly and could see I was pulling away from him. I was really pleased to bring the team home with a gold medal – it was an exhilarating race!

Our medals were presented to us by another swimming Olympian, Joe Roebuck. Rookwood School had three pupils taking part in seven races but in every race we won a medal - we all felt very proud of our individual and team achievements. And to top it all off the day ended with an overall win for London West.

#### **GCSE** Assessments

On Friday 30 November, the Year 11 GCSE Drama class performed their final acting assessments in front of an AQA examiner as well as their own family and friends. The students were required to present extracts from published plays and these included work by Shakespeare, John Godber, Dario Fo and the Greek playwright Euripides. The performances took place in the school hall in the afternoon and were well-received by the appreciative audience.

The scripted acting assessment represents 20% of their final Drama GCSE grade. Last March, the students also completed their devising unit worth 40%. The final 40% is in the form of the written examination which the students shall sit in May 2019. Mrs Blackmore said: "I remain immensely proud of my Year 11 students. Helping to develop the pupils' confidence to the point where they have been able to play their chosen roles with such maturity and believability has been an absolute pleasure."

Pupil Oliver commented "I found it a challenge learning all the words. With a lot of practice, Morgan and I pulled off the best performance we could have done. Thank you to Mrs Blackmore for going out of her way to help us."

## National Gallery

On Thursday 6 December, Miss Treasure and Miss Brown took Year 8 to The National Gallery in London to see the French Impressionist paintings that they had been studying in school.

The pupils enjoyed a fun and informative talk about the Impressionist style and how it was radically different from previous generations of French painters. Both Miss Treasure and Miss Brown felt proud of the pupils as they paid close attention and asked many intelligent questions.

After lunch they walked down Whitehall to the South Bank, admiring Nelson's Column, the historic building of Horse Guards, Downing Street, (where they believe they may have seen the Prime Minister being driven in a car with darkened windows) and Big Ben, unrecognisable under scaffolding and sheets.

They spent an hour on the South Bank enjoying the Christmas market and buying food and presents before returning to school.
